"Becoming Accountable In Healthcare"

Hosted by St. Vincent Health/Ascension Health, Indianapolis

Scottsdale Institute's Annual Fall Forum, held October 6 – 7, 2011, at the brand-new JW Marriott in Indianapolis, brought us to a large faith-based health system that is focused on mission as it moves forward like other SI organizations toward accountable care. SI Chairman Stan Nelson introduced Vincent Caponi, CEO of St. Vincent Health and Ministry Market Leader-Indiana/Wisconsin, Ascension Health, who welcomed 100 executives from SI member organizations and sponsors to discuss how health systems can use IT to become accountable in healthcare and position themselves for emerging payment systems based on value rather than fee for service. Alan Snell, MD, CMIO at St. Vincent Health, was a gracious and charming Master of Ceremonies.

Mr. Caponi described how Indianapolis-based St. Vincent, with 22 hospitals and 16,000 employees, aims to become a **"Highly Reliable Organization,"** or HRO, with a culture of safety built upon five precepts:

1. A preoccupation with failure;
2. Reluctance to accept simplifications;
3. Sensitivity to operations;
4. Resilience to error;
5. Deference to expertise.

A large and enthusiastic group of attendees joined the Friday morning tour to the Regenstrief Institute, a renowned medical informatics research center in Indianapolis, and to St. Vincent Health headquarters for presentations on the pioneering Indiana Health Information Exchange, the Indiana Network for Patient Care and other groundbreaking initiatives centered in Indianapolis. Highlighting the morning was a presentation by Clem McDonald, MD, D.Sc., former director of Regenstrief and The Indiana Network for Patient Care, and now director of The Lister Hill National Center for Biomedical Communications, part of the National Library of Medicine. A legendary pioneer in the use of

computers in healthcare, Dr. McDonald regaled the crowd with stories of the early days of medical informatics, the history of the Institute and what a critical role that clinical and IT standards play in the continuing advance of healthcare.
